News from the School Nurse

Illness Update

By Erving Elementary School standards we have a lot of sickness going around! Students and staff are predominantly being hit by a cold with a lingering, moist, non-productive cough and fever that appear flulike in nature. Also making an unwanted appearance, but to a lesser degree, is the fever and vomiting bug followed by diarrhea.

To slow the spread of illness, please keep your child(ren) home if they are feeling under the weather. School policy is that kids must be fever-free (under 100 degrees) without medication for a full 24 hours before returning to school. The same goes for vomiting. They may return only if they have not vomited within the last 24-hour period. Please remember that giving your child ibuprofen or Tylenol in the morning will not guarantee that they will be well enough to attend school. The medication wears off after a short time and then they are miserable, unable to participate and, often, this prolongs the illness because they have not been home resting, hydrating and recuperating. 


Synopsis: Our story begins with the song "There Once Was An Ugly Duckling" as a review of the familiar tale, which we have adapted for our play. We then have a dance for spring (Spring Dance, 2nd Grade) to set the scene for Mother Duck. Mother Duck is very proud of her 5 eggs, but we soon discover that a 6th egg has mysteriously appeared as part of her brood. The ducklings all hatch and parade off to meet the rest of the barn animals (Barn Dance, PreK, Kindergarten). It becomes clear that there are 2 who do not quite fit in with the rest of the ducklings - Ducky and Ugly. They decide to leave the farm and explore the world together. They meet many other animals on their travels, including the swans, geese (Geese Line Dance, 4th Grade), songbirds (Rockin' Robin, 1st Grade), Bob the Cat, and Turtle. They find that they are not the only ones who would like to spend time with friends who like them just the way they are, differences and all. The group of travelers grows to include Stanley the Goose, and Tweety the Songbird. After various adventures and narrow escapes, fall turns to winter, and winter (Winter Dance, 3rd Grade) turns to spring (Maypole Dance, 3rd Grade), and it is time to molt! Ducky is now an adult duck, Stanley an adult goose, Tweety an adult song bird, and Ugly is – surprise! – a swan! (You Ain't No Duck, 5th/6th Production Number). The swans come upon Ugly and his friends, and Ugly is faced with a choice - stick with his friends, who have shared in all his adventures, or join the swans, who look like him and are way-too-cool for his rag-tag band of bird friends.




