Both grades 5 and 6 recently finished reading the New York Times Bestselling novel, <u>Wonder</u> by R.J. Palaccio. This realistic fiction book deals with issues of acceptance and courage, among other things. The plot follows the main character, August "Auggie" Pulman in his first year of school, which isn't until fifth-grade. Auggie is unique in so many ways, not the least of which is being born looking incredibly different than most kids.

This book was actually a gift to me from a former student a few years ago, and I first read it to my children. If ever there was a family read-aloud book about the power of teaching kindness, respect and acceptance, this is it. Try it as a read-aloud with your own children. I promise you won't regret it!

After reading the book the 5th and 6th grade classes had the pleasure of attending Wonder, the movie, just recently released. What an amazing educational experience it was for students to see this beloved book, with its important themes, come to life.

CAN WE BE RATIONAL?


In math, students have been studying rational numbers, estimating sums, differences, and products of fractions. Students have been investigating these concepts and developing their understanding of them through working in partners on real-world setting problems. Partners and small groups collaborate, disagree, discuss and prove their thoughts to each other, and to the whole class.

BONING UP ON KNOWLEDGE

In science, students have been studying the human body, specifically the skeletal and muscular system. Students researched how their muscular system works through labs in which they reached muscle exhaustion. Students also investigated the earth science connection to physical science about how minerals from the earth are present in their bones. Without giving too much of this lab away to future students, it's safe to say that bones can be manipulated.


Dismissing your child after the Cookie Exchange and before lunch?

"Studying Erving Long Ago" with local historian and local resident Sara Campbell, teaching 1st and 3rd graders to be *History Detectives*


Thanks to the *Erving Local Cultural Council*, Sara Campbell returned to EES to work with 1st & 3rd graders during November.

Sara spent 4 sessions with each class looking at Erving's boundaries and its neighbors, its rivers and hills. The classes also discussed Native American presence before the incorporation of the Town of Erving. The 3rd graders focused on the 1870 maps and learned about early industry in Erving, and the people who lived here. 1st graders learned about the schools of the 1800s and learned to draw with improvised quill pens.
