The Wizard of Galafree

A Synopsis of our All-School Play

"Four children, four stones, to set free the bones of the master, the Wizard of Galafree." So goes the prophecy that sets the story of our play. It takes magic and imagination to get us to the land of Galafree, and it begins with four children having fun at a fair. Colleen, Jason, Gwen, and Will compare the small stuffed animals they have won (an owl, a bear, a snake, and a dog), enjoy a dance performance by the "Gallant Dancers of Galafree" (by the preschool) and then venture into the tent of a fortune teller. It's a bit spooky, but the fortune teller reveals that they will have a great adventure

in a place called Galafree. The children are puzzled, but take the information in stride as they go

on a unique carousel that has rainbow unicorns instead of horses! (3rd grade) Before the ride begins, the children discover a medallion hanging around the neck of one of the unicorns, and when it is removed, the ride speeds up to a magical pace, whisking them off to the land of Galafree.

In this magic land, the toy animals they won have come alive, (2nd grade) to serve as their guides and helpers, and the unicorns reappear as living creatures. The head unicorns give the children more information about the prophecy and the quest it describes. They tell them that the land of Galafree is ruled by the Wizard of Galafree, but an evil force has turned the Wizard to stone and imprisoned him on a high mountain. To free him, four children must search the land for four magic stones to fit in the medallion. With all four stones in place, the children must fly on to a magic bird in the mountain, and place the medallion around the neck of the wizard. This will break the spell, and evil will be banished from the land. The unicorns send the children off with a gift, a magic song that has the power to lift despair.

The children proceed into an ominous wood. Jason accidentally trips over a stone, and when he picks it up, the trees come to life (4th grade), trapping Jason and demanding the return of the stone. Through a game of "Streets and Alleys", the children trick the trees into releasing Jason. They quickly put the stone in the medallion, and the trees freeze! One stone found!

An elf appears with clues about the next stone, but a storm (1st grade) interrupts, and the children find themselves in a dark cave. A dragon lives in the cave, guarding a treasure, and although he at first frightens the children, he convinces them that he is really a unicorn, and has been bewitched. Through their kind efforts a second stone is found in the cave, the dragon is freed to return to his unicorn form, and the medallion is half-filled.

Suddenly, there are lights, music, and exuberant dancing (3rd grade), to introduce the game show "The Door of Fortune!". With help from the audience and the applause-o-meter, the children choose the right door and are rewarded with the third stone.

As they continue on their way, they are surrounded by the "Crying Creatures"

(Kindergarten), who exhibit infinite sadness with their weeping and wailing. The children are taken with the plight of these sad beings, and decide to use the Unicorn's gift of song. As they sing to the creatures, the sadness lifts and joy is restored. In gratitude, the Creatures present the children with the stone they have been forced to guard. The fourth stone has been found!

Lovely music is heard, and a spectacular bird appears to carry the children to the high mountain. The medallion is duly placed around the neck of the Wizard, the prophecy is fulfilled, and the Wizard is returned to life. Celebration by all!


When Worrying Takes Over:
