From The Principal's Desk:



Dear Families and Friends of Erving Elementary School,

I had the pleasure of attending the sixth grade Accelerated Reader ceremony on Wednesday of this week. During the assembly, students were honored for their accomplishment reading Accelerated Reader books. Accelerated Reader is a computer-based program that students at Erving Elementary school use to monitor their reading practice and progress. Teachers guide their students to books that match individual reading levels, then students can read the book and take a short quiz when they complete the book. The quick quiz is a way for teachers to see if their students understand what they read and to check for understanding. Congratulations to all of the 6th grade students that have received 50 and 100 points for their work on Accelerated Reader.

This week, members of the Erving Fire Department made a trip to the school to discuss fire safety. I would like to thank Caption Ryan Betters and Firefighter Brandon Breault, for taking the time to speak to parents at our Coffee Hour on Thursday. The Erving firefighters addressed the importance of smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, safe tips for using a wood burning stove and the importance of an in-home fire evacuation route to keep family members safe at all times.

On Thursday, students at EES practiced their second lock down drill of the school year. The purpose of the drill is to practice what children and adults will do if faced with a potential emergency in the building. As with fire drills and other safety programs, the hope is to acclimate students and teachers to a procedure that they will be able to follow quickly, effectively, and safely. All of our students and staff did a wonderful job during the drill.

We are still planning to offer the salad bar, starting on the week of February 3rd. We will be offering it on Mondays and Thursdays to start, and we would monitor the demand from there. We are very excited to have the fresh veggies back again.

If your financial situation has changed, it is a good time to revisit the free/reduced lunch application. Even though we are a "free lunch and breakfast" school, it is still important for us to get updated applications. We will always offer free meals, regardless of eligibility, but the applications help us to receive funding to continue doing so. You can get another application from the office.

Also, just a reminder: milk is included free with school lunches; however, if a child brings a home-lunch, and wishes to have milk, it will cost 50 cents. Water is always available for free.



Proper Ash Disposal

• Ashes cleaned out from the stove or fireplace should be shoveled into a metal bucket with a metal lid, placed outside, on the ground, away from the building, to prevent fires. Do not place ashes into a paper bag or cardboard box. Ashes and embers can stay hot for days and ignite combustibles.

Carbon Monoxide & Smoke Alarms

- Carbon monoxide alarms are required now in all homes with chimneys or woodstoves. Install one on every habitable level and no more than 10 feet from every bedroom door. Replace every 5-7 years.
- Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of your home, at the bottom of every stairwell and outside each sleeping area. Replace every ten years.
- Test alarms regularly and change alkaline batteries when we change the clocks.
- Consider installing alarms with sealed, 10-year batteries.


Carbon monoxide alarms are required in all homes with chimneys or woodstoves.



Chimney & Woodstove Fire Safety



In 2018, there were 556 fire incidents involving chimneys, fireplaces, and woodstoves. These fires were responsible for 1 civilian death, 3 civilian injuries and 7 firefighter injuries. They resulted in \$3 million in property losses. These incidents made up 38% of all fires linked to heating systems.



Purchasing

 Be sure the stove you are purchasing to burn wood or coal is approved by Underwriter's Laboratory or another recognized testing laboratory.

Installation

- A building permit must be obtained prior to the installation of fireplaces, wood or coal burning stoves. They must be inspected by the local building inspector prior to their initial use as required by the Massachusetts State Building Code.
- Allow at least 36 inches of space around the appliance to prevent combustibles from coming into contact with a heat source.
- Solid fuel heating appliances cannot share a common flue with chimney flues utilized by other solid fuel, fossil fuel, or gas fired appliances.

Inspections

 Have the chimney and flue inspected by a qualified mason prior to use.
 Cracks in the flue or mortar joints can allow flames and heated gases to extend into the structure.

Proper Use

- Most chimney fires occur due to a build-up of **creosote**, a tarry by-product of burning wood. Have your chimney flue cleaned before each heating season. Burn only dry, well-seasoned, hardwood to reduce creosote accumulation.
- Do not use flammable liquids to start the fire.
- Never leave children unattended near the stove.
- Check that the damper is open before lighting the fire. Failure to do so can result in an accumulation of smoke and carbon monoxide within the home. Do not close the damper before the fire has died out and the embers are cold.
- Use a fireplace screen to prevent flying sparks and embers from falling out onto the floor.
- Install and maintain smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to provide protection for your family.

Think Safety First When Heating your Home this Winter



Heating caused 7,053 fires over the past five years and is the number two cause of home fires in Massachusetts. Use your home heating system and space heating appliances wisely and responsibly. That's the way to *Keep Warm and Keep Safe*.

The ABCs of Fire Safety

- Make sure there are working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms on every level including one outside the bedrooms.
- Test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms monthly and change batteries twice a year, when you change the clocks.
- Hold home fire drills to practice the home escape plan.
- Practice home fire safety and set a good example for the children.

Be Careful When Using Fireplaces and Solid Fuel Stoves

If you heat your home by burning solid fuels (coal, firewood, pellets), be careful before, during and after using these kinds of fuels.

- · Have the chimney professionally cleaned every year.
- Make sure the stove is approved by a national testing agency such as Underwriter's Laboratory (UL).
- Get a building permit before installing a stove.
- Keep anything that can burn three feet away.
- Dispose of the ashes in a **metal** container, with a lid, away from the house, garage and porch.

Space Heaters Need Space

Fires caused by space heaters are rare but often deadly. If you must use a space heater, do so safely.

- Do not use space heaters as your #1 heating source.
- Keep anything that can burn three feet away.



- Use only heavy-duty extension cords.
- Always turn off when going to bed or leaving home.
- Portable kerosene heaters are illegal in MA for home use.

Maintain Natural Gas Equipment

Natural gas is a safe and efficient way to cook, heat our homes and hot water.

- Have your furnace and hot water heater professionally checked every year.
- Do not use or store gasoline or painting supplies inside where they can be ignited by the pilot light.

Gas leaks can be dangerous – if you smell something like rotten eggs or you think there might be a leak,

- Move outdoors.
- Do not smoke or turn on or off electrical switches sparks can cause an explosion.
- Dial 911 immediately.

Maintain Oil Heating Equipment

Home heating with fuel oil is also safe and efficient.

- Have your furnace professionally cleaned and checked every year.
- Don't let the tank get completely empty.
- Call for service if the oil burner releases smoke or soot in the house.

Carbon Monoxide: the Silent Killer

Heating equipment is the leading source of carbon monoxide (CO) in the home.

- Install carbon monoxide alarms on every level of your home.
- Don't use the gas stove or oven for heat.
- Have furnaces and chimneys checked annually by a professional.
- Keep appliance vents and exhaust pipes clear of drifting snow and bushes.

Generator Safety

Prevent Fires, CO Poisoning and Electrocution

Generators can be helpful when the power goes out for an extended period of time. It is important to know how use them safely to prevent fires, carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning and electrocution.



Purchasing and Preparing to Use the Generator

- Purchase one that has been approved by a nationally recognized testing agency such as Underwriter's Laboratory (UL).
- Have a licensed electrician install a "transfer switch"; never plug a generator directly into a wall outlet to avoid "backfeeding" which can electrocute utility workers.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for use of the generator. Be sure to read the instructions before you need to use the generator.
- · Install working CO alarms on every level of the home.

Using the Generator Safely

- Place the generator outdoors facing away from doors, windows and vents. Never use a
 generator inside a house, basement or crawl space not even inside a garage with the
 door open. When possible, place the generator 5-10 feet away from the house.
- Plug appliances directly into the generator or use heavy-duty, outdoor rated extension cords, not to exceed the number of outlets on the generator. Make sure cords are free of cuts and tears and have all three prongs especially the grounding pin.
- Keep the generator dry. Operate on a dry surface under an open canopy or tent.
- · Dry your hands before touching the generator.
- · Let the generator cool before refueling. Fuel spilled on hot engine parts could ignite.

Safely Storing and Transporting Gasoline to Power the Generator

- Transport gasoline safely, standing upright, in an approved container in the trunk of your car or back of a pick-up truck. You can transport a maximum of 21 gallons without a permit from the fire department, provided no single container exceeds 7 gallons.
- Store gasoline in a shed or detached garage away from the house; never store gasoline inside the home or an attached garage. Secure the shed or garage if possible, and keep flammable liquids out of reach of youngsters.
- Store gasoline far from any fuel burning appliance such as a furnace, water heater or woodstove. Vapors can travel back to their ignition source and ignite.

Erving Elementary School is beginning kindergarten registration for the 2020-2021 school year.

If you have a child who will be 5 years old by September 1, 2020, and you live in the town of Erving, they are eligible to attend kindergarten at Erving Elementary School.

Please pick up a registration packet at the school or contact the school at (413) 423-3326 to have a registration packet sent to you.

Any child currently attending preschool at Erving Elementary School that will move on to kindergarten next year is automatically enrolled for next year and a registration packet will be sent home with your child in February.

All registration packets need to be returned by March 30, 2020.
